even in the summertime, eager TJ Latiners continue to participate in the Latin community. here, we dive into two of the hottest happenings over the summer...

Virginia Governor's Latin Academy

Two TJ seniors, Rex Allard and Melissa Brown, attended the Virginia Governor's Latin Academy (known as "Gov School") this past summer, which was held at Randolph-Macon College in Ashland, Virginia. They had the opportunity to immerse themselves in the Classics for three weeks, starting in June, filling their days with an assortment of classes, activities, and games.

While we learn a lot about Roman culture here at TJ Latin, Gov School offers its students a unique chance to learn about Ancient Greece as well, with daily classes that alternate between Latin and Greek. In particular, Allard recalls, "I had a class on cults and things they did in these cults in the ancient times. That [class] focused more on the Greek side, [including] the hero cults and Eleusinian Mysteries."

The students are sorted into

different groups based on Roman provinces, including Italia, Aegyptus, and Gallia, and a big part of the experience included meeting all sorts of people from all over Virginia.

Brown remembers, "There was this one guy whose real name was Octavian, and he was a wrestler."

And often, after living and learning together, these friendships form lasting bonds.

"I definitely made a fairly large group of friends that I'm still in contact with," Allard says. "I'm actually bringing one of my friends from Gov School to state convention with our [TJ] delegation."

The three-week program included July 4th celebrations and culminated with an elaborate banquet.

"The potatoes were really good there. We counted; They had 20 different types of potatoes," Brown says enthusiastically. She



lists off a few, including curly fries, hash browns, tater tots, and sweet potato fries.

Both attendees strongly recommend the program, and assure TJ Latin students that the program is not at all overwhelming, rather, TJ students tend to be overprepared, especially in grammar, even if they might sometimes struggle in class. Still, there's plenty to learn, and lots of fun to be had.

If you're an underclassman with any level of interest in Latin and a couple weeks to spare at the beginning of summer break, consider applying for Gov School!

NJCL Convention

In late July, TJ Latin students spent a week at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia to take part in the 2023 National Junior Classical League (NJCL) Convention, often referred to as simply "Nats." As part of Virginia's delegation, they participated in a wide range of activities, including art contests, Certamen, spirit, and lectures called Colloquia. There was even a Greek-style agora, which is an open-air market that sold different trinkets, food, and books.

"It's like state convention, but on mega-steroids," Alex Bakalov, 11, explains. "Spirit is so much more, for more days. The tests— The projects— The amount of people that are there— Seeing the Virginia delegation as just one of these massive delegations, and not being the largest, is very different from the TJ feeling [at state convention] of totally dominating. It was a very good experience."

Even with strong competition, the Virginia delegation performed exceptionally well, placing first in spirit, and consistently placing at the top of the various academic tests and Certamen events.

"We had a lot of spirit, so we ended up getting first and we got a little kiddie pool for the entire state team. I think it's actually going to be at the VJCL convention this year," Bakalov says. Among the convention-goers was James Kennedy, 12. Nats was the first time he has attended any Latin convention, at the state or national level, and it left such a good impression that he decided to run for Praetor Magnus, the spirit coordinator of LHS. When asked about his favorite activity, he says, "We did the Olympika, [which were] basically sport events."

The TJ delegates had a blast staying at Emory, and have plenty more to share with anyone interested in attending next summer.






